HEAD TEACHER'S REPORT

Welcome to the summer edition of our magazine which is packed full of articles and photographs about activities in and beyond our classrooms which are developing our young people's knowledge, skills and confidence.

It has been a busy term for all. Our fourth years were on study leave very soon after their return from the Easter holidays on 25 April and our seniors joined them very quickly on 3 May. For the fourth years their first examinations are always a tense time but, from what we could see in school, they were into their stride very quickly and coping well with study leave, revision and rising to the



challenge of the examination papers. Our seniors, having been through the process the previous year should be more confident but we are always aware of how much their hopes and dreams for the future depend on a good performance in these high stakes examinations and so do all we can to support them at this time. Most that I have spoken to are relatively confident that they have done their best and are looking forward to getting their results which are due on 6 August and will be delivered by post to pupils' home addresses unless they have signed up to get their results by email or text message. The term was also a busy one for all our pupils in S3. They had their new courses to look forward to but also work experience which took place at the same time as activities week. Those I have spoken to enjoyed the opportunity to experience the world of work and although their placement is not always related to their future career it fosters their independence, resilience and self-reliance. They have to organise their own transport and interact with people they don't know in a very different environment to the familiar and comfortable one in school. Our three Heads of House do not waste this opportunity and build into PSE lessons leading up to work experience a series of activities related to the world of work including job applications and writing a CV.

Pupils in S1 and S2 enjoyed activities week and we were delighted that this year we were able to offer a range of opportunities some of which were free of any cost to families. You will see the range of activities that were available to pupils later in this magazine. The photographs are excellent evidence of the fun our pupils had but also of the contribution that this makes to our very positive school ethos and the growing confidence of our pupils. They also participated in Leadership Days to foster their skills in team work, communication and problem solving.

This term is also about planning and looking forward to the new session and there is a lot going on. By the end of term we will have finalised our calendar and you will find dates of key events on pages 8 and 9.

IMPROVING LEARNING AND TEACHING

Teachers have been busy preparing for the new courses and exams which our S4 pupils have just embarked on and are making sure they are familiar with and following all the advice which is coming out from the Scottish Qualifications Authority. Please be assured that we will be doing all we can to support our pupils and their families throughout the coming year. We are planning a Curriculum Open Night on 9 October 2013 for parents of our pupils as well as those in our associated primaries. The plan is to provide information about the courses and exams and then some live demonstrations of the active learning approaches which our staff have been developing. In the meantime there is more information on pages 6 and 7 of this magazine about the new courses and the exams.

Another new development for next year will be the welcome return of our own pupil planners. Due to financial constraints we had to find a cheaper source of diaries for our pupils. However I am delighted that we will be returning to the old style planners but we will be asking for a £1.00 contribution. The covers next year will feature the winning poster from our BoDA B's competition which was designed by Sarah Ross who is now in S4. The planners are bespoke which means they have been designed to our specifications. They will contain a new feature which is the **reflection pages**. Each morning we will ask all our pupils to reflect on and think about their learning from the previous day and write some notes about how they are getting on. Over the course of a week they will build up notes on things they are doing well and things they need to work on based on the feedback from their teachers – verbal and written. In PSE lessons with their Head of House they will use these notes to build up a folio of evidence of their progress. We have produced materials to support teachers and pupils with this work: prompt sheets based on our core skills framework which cover communication skills, thinking skills and personal/interpersonal skills. Pupils will be thinking about learning each morning not just in relation to the subject specific knowledge and skills they are developing but also more generic skills that they will need for learning, life and work. Of course pupils can, and probably should, reflect on their learning more often than this and if parents/carers wish to support this they can do so by asking questions and talking to their children about their learning and the feedback they get from teachers about what they are doing well and what they need to work on. So if your son or daughter says they don't have homework they could be reflecting on their learning!

IMPROVING OUR IT SYSTEMS



All staff have been busy getting used to our new Management Information System e1. This brings many of our procedures into the one system – registration, timetabling and monitoring and tracking of pupil progress. As with any new system it will take time for all our staff to get used to it and make use of its full potential.

IMPROVING FEEDBACK TO PUPILS AND PARENTS ABOUT THEIR PROGRESS

One feature of the system is that it will allow data about pupil progress in all their subjects to be recorded by their class teachers and then accessed by others teachers when appropriate.

Teachers will teach a block or unit of work and then, using an appropriate assessments, decide whether or not pupils have made progress is in line with what might be expected given their

prior attainment and achievements. Teachers will also be able to write a brief comment, and record a pupil's attitude to learning, effort and homework.

Pupils will know whether or not they are on track in their different subjects; what their strengths are and what they need to work on. They will be able to communicate this to their parents/carers.

The ability to access this information about groups or individuals will be particularly helpful for those with year group, house or subject responsibilities. Depute Head Teachers will be able to see the progress of the pupils in a year group in all their subjects and Heads of House to see the progress of the pupils in all their subjects in their house. This will allow appropriate intervention or support to be put in place should a pupil not be making progress in line with what is expected. However we will also be able identify those pupils who are exceeding expectations and for whom more challenging work would be appropriate. The picture of a pupil's progress over the course of a year could then feed into a report to parents.

We are hopeful that the system will reduce the workload for teachers in terms of administration and record keeping as well as improve the quality of information we give to pupils and parents/carers about progress. We will keep you informed about our own progress in this area.

IMPROVING LEARNING BEYOND SCHOOL

We will also be working on improving the links between home and school by giving parents and carers more information about how they can support their children's learning in and beyond school in the form of an information booklet.

GOODBYES AND HELLOS

None of the improvements and developments we take forward would be possible without the hard work and dedication of our teachers and support staff. We have had a number of changes in our teaching staff this year.

Miss Kirsty Chalmers in Business Education has been with us for just a year but packed a lot into her year including a school trip abroad and a lot of development work to support the new courses. In addition she supported our third year pupils in developing their knowledge and understanding of fair trade as well as their enterprising skills. Her contributions to the life and work of the school were appreciated by colleagues and pupils. She will take up a post in Robert Gordon's College after the summer holidays.



We have already said au revoir to Mrs Louise Marshall who began her maternity leave at the beginning of June. We wish her and her growing family well.

Mrs Nwadiogo Ezeh was one of our Home Economics teachers and has resigned to continue her studies after her maternity leave came to an end.

Miss Linda Thain had been on a career break from her post as a teacher of Modern Studies. She was due to return in August but she has decided to stay in Australia as she has secured employment as a social studies teacher.

Miss Heather Allan had also been on a career break in Australia and has decided to stay on as she too has secured employment as a teacher.

Miss Nadine Clark has left her post as a teacher of Spanish and French. She too was due to return in August but her experiences in the Far East have paid off as she has secured a Head of Faculty post at Robert Gordon's College.


The following table shows how the new National Qualifications replace current qualifications.

All pupils will follow a broad general education until the end of S3 and then choose four courses for fourth year in addition to English and Mathematics. Teachers will already have a good idea of what level they will be capable of from their work in S3 and therefore what they should be aiming for – National 3, 4 or 5 by the end of S4. The following diagram illustrates the different pathways that can be followed. However pupils will not be locked into a level even in classes where they are set by ability for example in English and Maths. There will be opportunities for pupils to prove they can improve and we will base our advice on evidence of performance to date from tests and class work compiled by pupils as well as guidance from the SQA.

The year ahead for pupils going into S4

Please be assured that teachers have been working very hard developing courses and making sure they are familiar with all the assessment arrangements for the new courses. Every course will be made up of units each of which will be assessed. For all courses pupils have to pass these unit assessments and an assessment designed to test their knowledge and skills across the full range of the course. In the case of National 1 - 4 there is no external examination and pupils receive a pass or a fail for the course. For National 5 courses pupils will also sit an external examination and this will be graded from A - D.

GRAMPIAN CHILDREN'S BOOK AWARD CEREMONY BY SAMANTHA WILDI 3 CRATHES

Our class started work on the Grampian Children's Book Awards in November 2012. We began by challenging ourselves to try and read as many of the shortlisted books as we could before the Award ceremony in May. There were six books on the shortlist and there were a variety of genres and themes

- *A Monster Calls* by Patrick Ness tells the tale of Conor. As his mother struggles to fight a fatal illness, a special surprise appears one night that will change Conor's life forever.
- *Out of the Depths* by Cathy MacPhail is a spine-chilling story involving ghosts, moving statues and a murder in a school.
- *The 13th Horseman* by Barry Hutchison is the action-packed tale of Drake who finds out that he is the fourth Horseman of the Apocalypse Death.
- *My Sister Lives on the Mantelpiece* by Annabel Pitcher is about a boy whose sister was a victim of a terrorist attack. Jamie doesn't understand as he is too young to remember her and the book shows his journey to understanding.
- *15 days Without a Head* by Dave Cousins is the story of Laurence who just wants a normal life which is not easy when your mother is an alcoholic and your brother thinks he's a dog.
- *Socks are not Enough* by Mark Lowery is the story of a boy who is horrified to discover that his parents are secret nudists.

On the 8th of May, the day of the Award ceremony, we met at English and then headed out of school, walking down past Scotstown Primary. As we passed the shops, some of us stopped for an early lunch of chips and with chips in hand, we walked along the pavement heading towards Aberdeen University. Our feet were sore from the fast pace and my feet from carrying all my school stuff plus all six of the shortlist books. When we entered the Arts Lecture Theatre, we were met with possibly 100 kids around our age, mulling around the room and crowding around a table filled with books for sale. We took a few minutes to look at all the posters from other

schools and then we were herded in to the lecture theatre where we sat down waiting for it to begin. The librarians took a few photos of us and then came the time for the authors to speak. Only four of the six authors were able to attend: Barry Hutchison, Cathy MacPhail, Dave Cousins and Mark Lowery. Each author was allowed to speak and then they answered questions from the audience. When the pupil awards came around, Allana Riddell of 3 Crathes won 2nd place in the poster competition. Then came the moment everyone had been waiting for. The winner of the 2013 Grampian Children's Book Award was announced - Patrick Ness, author of *A Monster Calls*.

ONE ONE SIX – SEATON COMMUNITY CHURCH'S YOUTH GROUP

This group started in February 2013 led by two Bridge of Don Academy Pupils and one former pupil. Dominique Nisbet and Callum Douglas who were both in S5 this year worked with Andrew Douglas who left school last year at the end of 6th year to set up and run a group for young people in Seaton.

The group, which meets on a Friday evening is still going strong and each week more than 30 young people aged 10 - 18 attend sessions where they can get involved in arts and crafts and music or listen to guest speakers such as Dons' striker Rory Fallon. The group has a tuck shop and gives young people a chance to socialise, and try things the young people might not otherwise be able to experience such as pool, the wii or a nail bar.

The group does give the young people a chance to find out more about God and the big questions in life and listen to stories about challenges and what the bible says about them.

This is a really good example of young people giving something back to their community and using their own skills and talents to help others.

STRATFORD-UPON-AVON TRIP

The farm is still run today as a Tudor farm. There were many different animals to see. To finish, the group were treated to a falconry demonstration. Everyone loved it. No-one was scared of the birds.....

That evening, everyone got themselves dressed in their finest attire for their visit to the theatre. Every



single pupil did Bridge of Don Academy proud with how they turned out! They were then treated to the RSC's latest production of 'Hamlet', directed by David Farr and starring Jonathan Slinger. Very interesting discussions were held on the way back regarding the portrayal of some of the characters. With everyone still on a high from their activities that day, the group went for a late night walk to the graveyard to see if the ghost stories told the night before were indeed true!

S2 'MAINS OF SCOTSTOWN' MASTERCHEF COMPETITION

The Maths and Home Economics departments work together on the Masterchef competition. Pupils are given a design brief to plan and prepare a 3 course meal for 5 people with an overall budget of £25.

Through this project pupils gain experience using mathematical skills in working with ratio, proportion, working within a budget, improving their ability to interpret information and strengthen problem solving. In the Home Economics department they gain skills in menu planning, practical skills and working with others.

Each register class in S2 prepares a 3 course meal and two classes are selected to go head to head in the Masterchef final. The classes in the final this year were 2X3and 2Y3.


S1 LEADERSHIP DAY WINNERS












SOLUTIONS TO PUZZLES FROM PREVIOUS MAGAZINE

1. In Hungry Horace's kitchen there were three tins. Each tin contained three delicious cakes:





